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Content Words VS Function Words

- **Content words** are words that provide information and meaning.
- **Function words** are necessary words for grammar, i.e, they make the sentence grammatically accurate).
- **1- Content words** are usually nouns, verbs, adjectives, and adverbs that give us important information required for understanding.
- Noun = person, animal, place or thing.
- Verb = action, state
- Adjective = describes a person, animal, place or object.
- Adverb = tells us how, where or when something happens.

Other Content Words include negatives like no, not and never; demonstrative pronouns including this, that, these and those; and question words like what, where, when, how and why...

- **2- Function words** help us connect important information and define the relationship between two words. they include auxiliary verbs, prepositions, articles, conjunctions, and pronouns.
- Auxiliary verbs = do, be, have...
- **Prepositions** = show relationships in time and space
- Articles = used to indicate specific or non-specific nouns
- Conjunctions = words that connect
- **Pronouns** = I, you, he... my, your, his... mine, yours, his...
