Imperatives, Let's

1. Examples

- **Open** the door. **Turn** right.
- **Don't** worry. **Don't** stop.
- **Be** quiet, please. Please **sit down**.

2. Examples with Let's

- **Let's** go home.
- **Let's not** stop.

Key Rules:

1. We use imperatives to tell somebody to do (or not do) something.

- ⊕ Imperatives = verb (infinitive).
- = Imperatives = don't + verb (infinitive).

Example: Open the door, please.

- We add *please* to be polite.
- We often use *be* + *adjective* in imperatives, e.g., Be quiet. Be careful.

- We don't use a pronoun with imperatives.
 - *Correct:* Be quiet.
 - *Incorrect:* ~~You be quiet.~~

2. We use ***Let's + verb (infinitive)*** to make suggestions.

- *Example:* Let's go home.

We use ***Let's not + verb (infinitive)*** to make negative suggestions.

- *Example:* Let's not stop.

Polite Alternative: "Can you...?"

Use ***Can you + verb (infinitive)*** as a polite alternative to an imperative.

- *Example:* Open the window. → Can you open the window, please?
