## **SYLLABUS**

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course examines the British political system. It presents different aspects of the United Kingdom as a constitutional monarchy with parliamentary democracy. The focus of the course is on a) the evolution of the British political system over centuries and b) how this evolution impacted contemporary Britain.

#### ATTENDANCE AND CLASS PARTICIPATION:

This course is lecture-based. Attendance is **optional**. Attendance in the TD sessions is **compulsory**.

#### **WEEKLY READINGS & ORAL PRESENTATIONS:**

Each week, a group of students is expected to analyze a specific theme related to the main subject. This includes: a) an oral (ppt) presentation and b) submission of apper. The students are expected to present and discuss the material in the TD session.

**QUIZ**: A quiz is expected.

**FINAL EXAM:** There will be a final exam at the end of the semester, which will include avaried assessment (short answers, matching, gap-filling, MCQ, True/false pattern, Identifications...)
